Community Partnership Is The Focus Of New Non-Profit in Bailey

“When one door closes, another opens.”

This proved to be so true when, on July 1, the Platte Canyon Community Partnership (PCCP) Resale Boutique opened on the site where the previous Peaceworks thrift store was operating in downtown Bailey.

The new non-profit was formed by a core group of volunteers who felt the store was important to the community and offered a variety of opportunities for individuals to volunteer.

They immediately determined the new organization would expand its reach by contributing to the communities along the HWY 285 corridor from Shawnee in Park County to Conifer in Jefferson County.

In three months they created a new non-profit that will help other organizations - many of which serve the youth in the area. They include:

- Mountain Peace Domestic Violence Shelter
- Boys and Girls Club of South Park-Bailey

- 285 Backpack Project and the
- Platte Canyon Scholarship Fund.

The individuals volunteering in a variety of capacities are determined to be successful and bring experience including retail, banking, small business development, and thrift store experience. Many are involved in other local organizations along the 285 Corridor.

There is also a host of others who just want to help (see page two) and who are integral to future success.

However, keep in mind an all-volunteer organization always need help.

The boutique is located between Knotty Pine and the Conoco station in downtown Bailey. It shares its space with Debreeze Honey.

Resale Boutique Is Also a Gift Shoppe

The plan is for the completely redecorated boutique to become a community focal point where guests can shop and visit while contributing to the community.

The open, pleasing environment mixes new and quality resale items with themed gift baskets and donated hand-

made items from individuals and craft groups in the area.

As the boutique expands it is hoped there can be even more support for local artisans through weekend craft shows

The resale items are all donated and carefully sorted and cleaned to be sure every-

thing is in good condition.

The clothing, housewares, accessories, home décor, and furniture are usually at 75% off of original retail price.

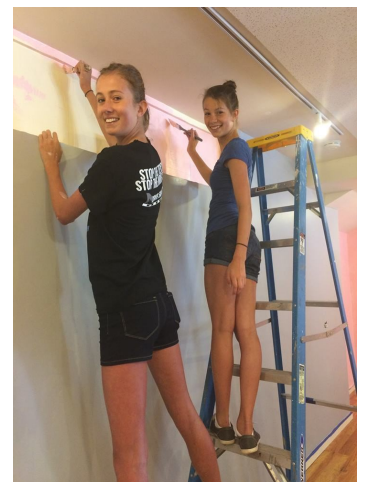
PCCP Board President
